

John 294 “Don’t You Know Yet That I Have To Do All This Alone?” Part 2

John 18:11; Ephesians 3:18-21; Psalm 22:1-8

(Our Pater which art in Heaven)

God the Father, our Pater has the power to perform the seemingly impossible.

Right now, we are in the Royal Family and never before in history in any other dispensation has every believer been left on earth to glorify God as we are and for what purpose? To keep on learning of Him and His wondrously gracious plan for us.

And why do we need to keep on learning of Him? Because royalty has to be inundated with fact that royalty lives in a palace, royalty has material things, royalty possesses wealth, royalty has leadership and royalty has the best of whatever royalty wants.

True love depends on capacity of soul and that’s why we have to learn to love because to love like Jesus loves requires knowing how to do something before, we can do it or ever hope to properly express it.

And how is this accomplished? By recognizing the consistent grace provided for us on the part of Pater and constantly receiving Pater’s Word as His Patricians!

God the Father, our Pater, the author of the divine plan is the One who authorized the divine decrees, formed the Royal priesthood and decided what each of us as His representatives would receive by way of His greater-grace blessings.

God’s glory is His very Essence which is reflected in those who carry with them substantial soul inventories filled with the mind of His Son, Jesus Christ.

twenty-four hours before the Cross, must line up perfectly with the Father’s plan.

Any person who has a special mission to accomplish by himself must remain alone and focused in his motivation to see it through to the end.

Everything connected with our Lord’s final twenty-four hours before the Cross, must line up perfectly with the Father’s plan.

When the Lord Jesus is on the Cross, no one is supporting Him, even the few who are reasonably close to Him can do nothing for Him at that time.

When our Lord was on that Cross for us, He was more alone than any of us will ever experience!

When Jesus said He was forsaken by God, He was describing the position of the greatest isolation ever endured.

For the most part, the only company our Lord will have for the majority of the early hours on the morning of His death will be hostile, hateful onlookers that are relishing in His brutal suffering, enjoying every minute of it.

When a person is really alone, virtually everyone who loves him is gone and practically everyone who hates him is with him!

There was one thing the Lord Jesus had that could not leave Him alone and that was the very thing that kept Him on the Cross, the biblical truth He had in His soul!

All that is going on is a reminder to Jesus of just how alone, alone could possibly be.

The experience of isolation always begins when someone we thought we could count on, lets us down.

The people that are the hardest for us to shake loose from are those with the greatest capacity for love.

But the Lord Jesus Christ must be isolated even from those who have the greatest capacity to love Him if He’s going to finish His mission.

The Father cannot give this cup to the Son until the Son is completely alone.

If we have a well-built soul structure comprised of a well-stocked soul inventory of God’s truth;

even when it's so dark that we can't see at all, we will still see spiritually and get around quite well!

In those last three hours on the Cross, Jesus suffered eternal separation from His loving Father just for us!
